

SOCIETY ISLANDS

TAHITI • HUAHINE • TAHAA' (MOTU MAHANA)
BORA BORA • MOOREA

These islands are the pulse of French Polynesia. Shaped by myths and legends and surrounded by turquoise lagoons, they are the quintessential image of a South Seas paradise. Tahiti bustles as the economic heart of French Polynesia and serves as the gateway to other islands. Bora Bora's formidable peaks and blue-marbled lagoon make it one of the most romantic islands on Earth. Snorkelers can touch velvety rays, swim with sharks, or drift among coral gardens full of kaleidoscopic fish. Moorea is famous for its ruggedly beautiful profile—a crown of sawtooth peaks that rise out of the lagoon like the legendary Bali Hai they are said to have inspired. Huahine's hidden temples, stone fish traps, and sacred blue-eyed eels lend mythical intrigue to a quiet island that's been able to preserve its cultural roots. Grab a chilled tropical drink from the floating bar or try your hand at weaving a palm basket from Motu Mahana, Paul Gauguin Cruises' private islet off the coast of Taha'a—and your complimentary playground.

TUAMOTUS FAKARAVA • RANGIROA

The Tuamotus are every diver's dream—secluded coral atolls surrounding lagoons dense with exotic fish and precious corals. Here, too, are black pearl farms, quaint villages, and blissfully quiet beaches. Divers call Rangiroa's bountiful green lagoon "God's Aquarium." Fakarava is a UNESCO-designated Biosphere Reserve, home to rare plants, birds, and crustaceans, as well as exceptional dive sites. Changing currents attract a variety of marine life, from wild dolphins to sharks, turtles, and manta rays.

MARQUESAS ISLANDS

FATU HIVA • HIVA OA • TAHUATA • NUKU HIVA

These islands are wild and remote. Steamy jungles cloak mountains that rise straight out of an indigo ocean. Ancient archaeological sites abound with temples and tikis that inspire sculptors to create

traditional wood carvings. Marvel at Fatu Hiva's spectacular cliffs and ravines, tap into your inner anthropologist at Hiva Oa's massive stone tikis, stroll an ancient royal walkway on Tahuata, and revel at the sky-high waterfalls on the mystic island of Nuku Hiva.

COOK ISLANDS AITUTAKI • RAROTONGA

Peace and quiet prevail on these blissfully isolated islands of silk white sands and pendulating palm trees. Snorkel over giant clams in Aitutaki's exceptionally large triangular lagoon, laze on uninhabited motus, or tap into the tranquil life of the coastal villages. On Rarotonga, hike over jungle-wrapped mountains and lush green valleys to a flat coastal plain that eases into white-sand beaches and a crystalline lagoon.

TONGA VAVA'U

Tonga is the only Polynesian/Melanesian territory never to have been colonized, so its unique culture can be experienced around every corner. The pace is easy, the trade winds balmy, and the song of the surf as melodic as the *a cappella* songs of its people. Meander in the only botanical garden in Vava'u, or attend an interactive Polynesian Cultural Show.

TIMOR-LESTE DILI

Dili, the capital of one of the world's youngest countries, is a sleepy town with colonial Portuguese influences. If you're feeling energetic, climb the 580 steps to the Cristo Rei.

COOK ISLANDS

FIJI VITI LEVU • VANUA LEVU • BEQA ISLAND

The islands of Fiji straddle both Polynesian and Melanesian cultures. On Viti Levu and Vanua Levu, waterfalls gurgle through rainforests, natural swimming pools glisten, and mangroves form natural breakwaters against the sea. Witness a tongue-numbing kava ceremony or check out traditional fire-walking on Beqa Island.

VANUATU ESPIRITU SANTO

Reefs and wrecks are diving hallmarks of this pristine Melanesian island, which, in the peak of World War II, served as a supply depot for the Allies. Today its chief calling cards are the underwater relics, white-sand beaches, Smurf-blue swimming holes, and a mountainous interior daubed with blazing tropical blooms. Vanuatu also happens to be one of the world's least-visited countries because it's so hard to get to, so a small-ship chaperone is the perfect solution.

INDONESIA KOMODO ISLAND • BALI

As the largest island country in the world, Indonesia comprises thousands of islands and hundreds of ethnic groups. Get close to Indonesia's version of Jurassic Park on Komodo Island, the rugged volcanic homeland of the world's largest lizard, the eponymous Komodo dragon. Bali packs a perfect mix of culture, nature, and leisure. Temples, galleries, shops, idyllic beaches, and volcanic mountains girded with rice paddies make it a photographer's paradise.

SOCIETY ISLANDS

AUSTRALIA THURSDAY ISLAND

Roughly 2,000 years ago, Melanesian and Polynesian settlers arrived on the shores of the Torres Strait Islands, in the far north of the Australian state of Queensland. Today, the unofficial capital of this archipelago is Thursday Island, originally called "Waiben" (believed to mean "no water") by the Melanesians but today known locally as "Ti." Immerse yourself in the island's cultural mix of Asian, European, and Pacific Island influences at the Gab Titui Cultural Centre.

PAPUA NEW GUINEA

SAMARAI ISLAND • PORT MORESBY


A mountainous country of cultural diversity and more than 800 languages, Papua New Guinea is famous for its unparalleled tribal art and exotically embellished *bila* costumes. Abandoned during World War II for fear of a Japanese attack, Samarai Island is now a National Historical Heritage Island. There's great snorkeling and diving at the wharf, where massive shoals of tiny silversides shimmer like giant disco balls. At Port Moresby, visit Parliament Haus, built in the style of a Sepik River spirit house.

SOLOMON ISLANDS GUADALCANAL

Like emeralds strewn on blue glass, the Solomon Islands appear almost as if nature absentmindedly tossed them out to sea. This archipelago is a late bloomer on the tourist front, yet has some of the best dive sites in the world. Crystalline waters abound with fish, giant clams, and sunken warships and aircraft scuttled at the end of World War II. On shore, pay tribute at the hilltop American Memorial to those lost at sea, while taking in incredible views of Mount Austen and Ironbottom Sound.


POLYNESIAN CULTURE: TIFAIFAI & BREADFRUIT


Tifaifai [tuh-fee-fee]

Amongst the countless crafts and exquisite jewelry pieces you'll find at the local island markets, ornate quilts called tifaifai may catch your eye. Meaning "to mend" in Maori, these patchwork blankets were historically crafted from scraps of fabrics and pieces of old cloth, as fabric was considered a luxury and hard to come by on the remote islands. Tifaifai are made by the matriarchs, or mamas, of the local communities and are given as tokens of love, affection, and celebration.

Each blanket takes hours of hard work, and groups of mamas often work together to create one design. These get-togethers are considered sacred and are used to share tips, tricks, and secrets of the craft. Traditionally, seaside scenes were depicted on the designs; today, however, the designs can be as intricate as Polynesian tattoos. Know someone who is getting married or having a baby? Pick them up a tifaifai as a congratulatory gift while you are in the South Seas—and why not treat yourself to one, too?

Breadfruit [Uru] Tree

The towering trunks of the breadfruit, or *uru*, tree can be seen throughout the islands, with their large orb-like fruits hanging low from long, arcing limbs. The bumpy, light-green fruit is a staple in Polynesian cuisine and played a huge role in colonizing the islands.

Distinct and unique, the cream-colored flesh of the breadfruit takes on the taste profiles of both a fruit and vegetable, making it extremely versatile. Immature breadfruit is often sliced and cooked, while fully ripe breadfruit is sweeter and creamier and can be found in pies and flan.

Once considered a super fruit, it is often a substitution for potatoes in recipes due to its similar texture and taste. Rich in antioxidants, vitamins, and minerals, it's a healthy (and delicious) island snack!

Try breadfruit while in the islands or while on board *The Gauguin*. It is featured on the menu on Polynesian night when it is in season.





Fittingly, your journey begins in the vibrant capital city of Papeete, where you can explore markets, museums, and galleries.

Awaiting in the harbor: the m/s *Paul Gauguin*.

HUAHINE In the brilliant morning light, a palette of blues and greens greets you as *The Gauguin* reaches her first port. The excitement is tangible as guests gather on deck and snap pictures, lost in absolute wonder.

Huahine. "The Garden Island."

Lush rain forests, dramatic landscapes, and idyllic lagoons are just the beginning of one of French Polynesia's best-kept secrets.

Hidden temples embellished with rare orchids, romantic enclaves, and untouched hideaways await at every turn.

The pace here is relaxed. Tranquility floats in the air. Serenity surrounds you like an embrace. The splendor of the landscape playfully wrestles with the kaleidoscopic wonderland just beneath the surface of crystal waters. Let your own desires shape your day. Wander the village. Take in the spectacular views. Lounge on the beach.

views, seeing cannons from World War II, and traveling along Bora Bora's north shore for a visit to the lush valley of Fa'anui. The journey concludes with spectacular views and photo opportunities of Fa'anui Bay from a traditional plantation high up in the mountains.

But if you find yourself in Tahiti, one of the only producers of the spice in the world—please, please re-consider which flavor you opt for.





"My job is to provide five-star wine service to our guests. The most common question I get is, of course, a simple one: 'What wine complements my meal best?'

For white fish, I highly recommend a Sauvignon Blanc from New Zealand. It has a dry, crisp, and light character that best suits the firm texture of the fish. If a guest selects an entree like steak, lamb, or even chicken, I recommend a full-bodied Cabernet Sauvignon or a great Bordeaux. The richness of the wine and its tannins can stand up to the full flavor of the meat. And of course, a glass of sparkling wine is a perfect accompaniment to any dessert!

Personally, my favorite menu on board is the degustation menu in La Veranda. The preparation is unique and very French. Seared foie gras and tuna sashimi go well with a glass of Chateau d'Yquem or a sweet wine. Escargots and mushrooms pair nicely with a beautiful Sancerre Tuileres."

main course, there is an astounding array of desserts and fruits and cheeses to cap off your meal. I usually finish lunch with a double espresso or a cortado to fuel the rest of the day's adventures.

The evening meal is always an event. Whether you've spent the day on shore, enjoying the pool deck, or taking in entertainment at La Palette, it's time to head back to your stateroom to refresh and put on something nice. Nothing *formal*... just something to feel great in as you enjoy dinner and as the evening unfolds. The traditional Tahitian fish salad: *poisson cru*. Picture this: fresh tuna diced alongside a bevy of tomatoes, cucumber, onion, carrots, sliced scallions, and chopped parsley. Lime jus, salt and pepper, and a splash of coconut milk bring this incredible dish together with exquisite hints of citrus and various mouthwatering textures. Calling it "excellent" would be an understatement.

Some evenings we may do every course, other nights we might select three or four. Portions are sized appropriately so you can try different dish combinations to create your own symphony of flavors. With the variety and range of each menu, we'd be happy to have every dinner of the cruise here in L'Etoile, but on board *The Gauguin*, there is so much more—and we are going to try it all!

The next day, we might want to make a dinner reservation at one of the other two restaurants aboard the ship. The limited number of diners each evening in both La Veranda and Le Grill automatically creates a sense of exclusivity—but remember, it's all included with Paul Gauguin Cruises. 





Your guide will show you how to safely operate the WaveRunner, then off you go to zip about the lagoon. Safe, exciting, and a true adrenaline rush.

BORA BORA (OVERNIGHT) Spend two days here, inside the postcard looking out. With the castle-like centerpiece of Mount Otemanu soaring skyward, the "Romantic Island" offers a decadent display of endless blue skies, emerald waters, and colorful wildlife on land, sea, and air. Tuck a hibiscus flower behind your ear, go native, and surrender to

the fragrant breezes of one of the world's top honeymoon destinations.

One of the most unforgettable experiences you'll find in the South Pacific is the opportunity to stand in shallow waters as beautiful, playful (and harmless) stingrays swim around you. Do this on the **Sharks & Stingrays Encounter** shore excursion.

The rays are accustomed to visitors and gently glide around you as your guide feeds them, and even holds them, giving you the chance to stroke their satiny skin. This story will inspire disbelief every time you tell it.

RANGIROA Welcome to the largest atoll of the Tuamotus (and the second largest in the world). Take a few moments for your eyes to adjust to this color spectrum: from the deepest blue to green so pale it's almost white (and a peacock's worth of every color in between). Surrounded by two bodies of water, Moana-tea (Peaceful Ocean) and Moana-uri (Wild Ocean), Rangiroa's lagoon invites you below the surface to snorkel or dive, or view from above by canoe, kayak, or glass-bottom boat. Rangiroa is also one of the world's most coveted dive destinations: 240 tiny islets encircling a vast blue lagoon create a surreal marine habitat that must be experienced to be believed.

The Gauguin's Black Pearl Farm excursion shows you how pearls are grown and harvested, and watch a grafter as he skillfully plies his trade. Or if you want to take advantage of this area's superior diving, embark on **SCUBA Rangiroa**, where divers explore the famed Tiputa Pass to possibly swim alongside hammerhead sharks, manta rays, and dolphins.

FAKARAVA They call it the "Island of Dreams," but you could never sleep through this. The second-largest of the Tuamotu atolls (second only to Rangiroa), Fakarava's rectangular reef is home to a rich ecosystem, one of seven designated UNESCO Biosphere Reserves for the preservation of rare species. Above and below the water, it's as if Mother Nature put on her best dress for you to admire and exclaim, "My. Aren't you fetching."

Naturally, Fakarava lures divers from all over the world. Take a peek below the surface. You may see barracudas, manta rays, eagle rays, hammerhead sharks, dolphins, and turtles playing in the dramatic coral landscape. On land, let the seabreeze guide you to the southern end of the lagoon, where you'll find a church made entirely of coral, built by missionaries in 1874.

AT SEA As *The Gauguin* glides from the Tuamotu Archipelago toward the tranquil island of Taha'a, you will enjoy a full day at sea.

There is something innately glamorous about lounging on the deck of a ship as the horizon drifts past. TAHITI

Your ship awaits. How many people can say that?

Your voyage begins in Tahiti. And that, as they say, is a very good place to start. There's an energy and buzz to the capital city of Papeete that is unmistakably Polynesian. Vibrant, friendly, and unpretentious, the city is the flip side of the island's majestic peaks, lush jungles, tumbling waterfalls, and stellar blue lagoon. Before you sail, pick up any last-minute necessities, grab some authentic local cuisine in a café, and gear up for the unforgettable days to come. Or wander about and soak up some history, culture, island lore, and art. Museums, galleries, and historical points of interest abound.

If, by chance, you've been considering your first (or next) tattoo, Tahiti is where the art form began. From the Tahitian word *tatau*, "to strike," tattoos in this part of the world are very distinctive and symbolic. If you're in the market for some ink, do some research, visit prospective artists, and consider taking the plunge on your final day of the cruise, which returns you to Papeete.

HUAHINE Midway between Tahiti and Bora Bora lies this sleepy isle. Seen from the air, the "Garden Island" is actually two—Huahine Nui and Huahine Iti, connected by a man-made bridge and cradled by a coral reef. Not as developed or populous as its neighbors, Huahine is like a wish list for everything you'd want in a romantic fantasy destination. Swaying palm trees, fragrant flowers, aquamarine waters, and beaches with sand as soft as talc.

AT SEA As *The Gauguin* carries you to your next port, the Cook Islands, why not start the day in a truly decadent way? Enjoy breakfast in bed, which will have you feeling like royalty. An appointment in the ship's award-winning Deep Nature Spa is another indulgence. Whether you choose a volcanic hot stone massage, relaxing facial, body treatment, or all of the above, you're in very good hands.

During this day at sea, you can be as active or idle as you wish. Learn Tahitian language,

dance, customs, or history—or the proper way to tie a *pareo*—every hour brings a range of activities for every taste.

Make sure to be on deck for a sunset that spans the color spectrum, followed by a night sky so brilliant with stars, you'll wonder how there can possibly be room up there for all of them.

AITUTAKI The Cook Islands, called the "15 best kept secrets in the South Pacific" by travel guide *Ordinary Traveler*, were settled in the 6th century by Polynesians who migrated from Tahiti. Fast forward to 1820, when they were named for British navigator James Cook. Today, the islands are much as they were when the first settlers reached their shores—unspoiled, peaceful, lovely, and quiet.

The first recorded European to have reached this paradise was Captain William Bligh, shortly after the famous mutiny on his ship, *The Bounty*, in 1789.

The second-most visited of the Cook Islands, triangular-shaped Aitutaki is nearly flat, meaning your ocean view from virtually any point is limitless—and flawless. As waves lazily caress the reef, you are a world away. While here, don't miss the local fare, especially the *ika mata*—fish marinated in coconut cream and lemon juice.

Travel back in time with a fascinating look at ancient life in the South Pacific on the **Aitutaki Discovery Safari**. Hear the legends and explore the sites of rituals, sacrifices, battles, celebrations, and courtships. Your guided 4x4 trek will include the ancient temple grounds of Are Manga and the 1,000-year-old "Stone of Rae," the throne of a warrior said to have been the strongest man on Aitutaki. You'll also ascend to the island's highest peak, Manga Pu, for a panoramic view of the island and its glittering lagoon.

RAROTONGA From the deck of *The Gauguin*, the primal call of drums may be the first thing you hear. Next, your astounded eyes will take in the massive cathedral-like shell of an ancient volcano rising majestically against a sapphire sky. The largest of the 15 fabled Cook Islands, Rarotonga is embraced by a sparkling

lagoon, sugar-white sands, and the friendly wave of palm trees. The unmistakable island sound of ukuleles floats in the air. Genuine smiles welcome you ashore.

Be warned: On Rarotonga, hurrying is strictly forbidden. The law of the island is to relax and immerse yourself in music, culture, history, and of course, unmatched beauty. This is the true island experience.

One of the Cook Islands' best-known traditional healers, the legendary Pa is an unbounded font of knowledge on the natural healing properties of Rarotonga's indigenous flora. Discover the wisdom of Pa, retrace the paths of his ancestors, and learn island culture and history on the popular excursion **Pa, Son of Rarotonga**.

AT SEA Days at sea are supremely relaxing and perfect for catching up. Think of all the pictures you've taken and haven't even had time to review. Pick up some postcards and jot off some envy-inducing "wish you were here" notes. Wander up to the deck and see the panorama of the South Pacific drifting by.

Take in a fun and interactive lecture from a roster of anthropologists, archaeologists, and marine biologists, as well as visiting experts. Play a few games of ping pong, shuffleboard—even coconut bowling.

The Gauguin comes alive after the sun sets. Try your luck at slot machines, blackjack, and roulette in Le Casino, or grab a nightcap and unwind at the Piano Bar. Le Grand Salon features movie nights, guest entertainers, and Les Gauguines and Les Gaugins performing ancestral dance and traditional songs. Of course, you could always dance under a canopy of stars on deck. Most likely, you'll fall asleep with a smile. Sweet dreams.

BORA BORA (OVERNIGHT) On 11-night sailings, spend two days here, on the supermodel of the South Pacific. Famous. Exquisite. Adored. Achingly beautiful. You've seen countless photos and magazine covers, movies, and appearances on Top Ten lists. Your pulse will race as you approach one of the most storied islands in the world—and you



will find that photographs don't even come close to the real deal.

The best course of action is just to surrender to the considerable charms of this island. With so many things to do and see, you will easily fill your two days here. First, there's the water. Dazzling, warm, and inviting, Bora Bora's lagoon offers a cinematic below-the-surface experience for diving, snorkeling, and fishing. Above: sailing, kayaking, jet skiing, motorboat tours—the list goes on and on.

The reality is, you'll have to dry off at some point. Guided hiking, helicopter flightseeing, 4x4 excursions, exploring ancient temples—this list is likewise endless.

It may surprise you that an island so vibrant by day is, by contrast, very quiet after sundown. Brace yourself for a ravishing sunset. It's hard to imagine a setting more conducive to romance.

TAHA'A [MOTU MAHANA]

Ask anyone who has been to Taha'a what their first impression was, and many will recall the scent of vanilla lingering in the air. So exotic. So seductive. The rich soil of Taha'a is perfect for growing vanilla, watermelon, and copra.

Life is simple here. You will be charmed by the warm smiles greeting you as locals pass by on bicycles. Tour a plantation or pearl farm. Or grab your snorkel gear and head out to Motu Mahana, Paul Gauguin Cruises' own private islet. The dive staff will have the kayaks waiting, the wait staff will have your coconut cocktail ready—and it's quite likely that there is a chair under a shady palm calling your name.

MOOREA (OVERNIGHT) The island of Moorea is a study in contrasts. The serrated shell of an ancient volcano wrestles with satiny white beaches. The impossibly blue sky pushes against an incandescent turquoise lagoon. The sum is considered by many to be one of the most romantic spots on Earth. Even from the sky, this heart-shaped island sends love.

If one day is not enough to consume this feast for the senses, *The Gauguin* gives you two on all 11-night sailings. Take in the inconceivable beauty that surrounds you. Lift your face to the sun, close your eyes for a moment, and listen to the music of the island.

It's just another day in paradise on the **BBQ on Motu & Snorkeling** excursion. Glide through the crystal waters of Moorea's north coast, soaking up the exquisite views of Cook's Bay and Opunohu Bay, then spend some time swimming with gentle, playful stingrays. From there, a private motu barbecue awaits, complete with demonstrations of cuisine prep, coconut shucking, and *pareo* tying. Top it all off with more downtime for swimming, snorkeling, and taking it easy.

PAPEETE, TAHITI Sail back to our point of origin, Papeete, Tahiti. For one last magical evening on deck, raise a glass with the friends you've made here. Here's to you.

Armed with matchless memories, return to the "real world." When you feel the caress of a warm breeze or the kiss of the sun on your shoulders, think of the islands and of your friends on board. Don't miss your one last chance for souvenir shopping. You can't keep ignoring the Tahitian pearl that has been calling you.

With the sunrise comes the conclusion of your cruise experience. How did it come so quickly? The best news is *The Gauguin* considers you family and eagerly awaits your return.

Some call Aitutaki one of the few lagoons in the world that can rival Bora Bora. I would agree with that thought. The sight of the crystal-clear turquoise lagoon will take your breath away. Spend your one day here wisely by heading out on the lagoon! A little-known fact is that Aitutaki was visited by The Bounty 18 days before the famous mutiny. Captain Bligh noted how friendly the locals were compared to other islands, and to this day the people on Aitutaki are some of the friendliest islanders you will encounter. ♪





Your two-week journey aboard the m/s *Paul Gauguin* begins in one of the world’s most celebrated destinations. For this once-in-a-lifetime excursion, consider arriving a day early and/or extending your stay after the cruise. You’ll want more time in this fabled land.

AT SEA There’s something very special about the first day at sea on board *The Gauguin*. This is Page 1, with many unimaginable chapters ahead. Will your story be a romance? A fantasy? An adventure? Maybe all of these. Probably much more.

Do a little exploring. Get to know this beautiful vessel, which will take you to many great places.

FAKARAVA Lovely, serene, and virtually untouched by modern distractions, the second-largest atoll (or coral island) in the South Pacific offers a rustic backdrop for your fantasy of being a castaway in paradise. Pristine beaches surround one of the clearest lagoons in French Polynesia—a designated UNESCO Biosphere Reserve. The view below the water is as cinematic as it is above—and that’s saying something. Whether you snorkel or dive, you’re in for a great show. Against the backdrop of the dazzling coral reef, you’ll spy barracudas, turtles, dolphins, and manta rays. This is also one of the few spots in the South Pacific where you can see hundreds of gray reef sharks in the same area. That should get the adrenaline pumping. (The sharks are not dangerous when approached correctly; diving with a guide will ensure your safety.)

Spend quality time on land, as well. A paved road encircling the island is perfect for exploring by foot or by bike.

AT SEA *The Gauguin*’s heated, mahogany-framed saltwater pool is calling. Please report to Deck 8. The sensation of being in the water while traveling on the water should not be missed. Take a dip. Grab a chaise and your favorite cocktail. Chat up your fellow poolies—one meets the most interesting people while at sea.

FATU HIVA The Marquesas: Wild. Dramatic. Bold. The Pacific Ocean pounds against jagged cliffs. In contrast to the aquamarine and turquoise waters of French Polynesia, the water here is a deep indigo. Sharply sculpted mountains reach so high, the fine mist of clouds come down to meet them.

The southernmost island in the Marquesas, Fatu Hiva may also be the most beautiful. This isolated paradise really is “off the radar.” No airstrip, only one road, and just 500 residents. Explorer and archaeologist Thor Heyerdahl immortalized Fatu Hiva in a book of the same name published in 1974, detailing his one-and-a-half-year quest to escape civilization in the 1930s. Little has changed since then.

HIVA OA The second-largest of the southeastern Marquesas, Hiva Oa beckons with deep valleys, rugged peaks, and dense velvet rainforests. The city of Atuona is a favorite of the yacht set, with just enough of a small island/cosmopolitan vibe to make things interesting. It’s easy to understand how artist Paul Gauguin and Belgian-born singer/songwriter Jacques Brel fell madly in love with this isle and called it home. (They’re still here; you can visit both at the Calvaire Cemetery.)

Hiva Oa’s jungles hold secrets, including ancient, massive stone tiki carvings and petroglyphs whose true meaning has never definitively been explained. If you enjoy exploring, this is the place.

Discover the ancient tribes of the Taaoa Valley during an unforgettable off-road expedition on the **Atuona to Taaoa** excursion. The island’s rich history plays out before you as you visit beautifully preserved dwellings, ceremonial sites, and sacred archaeological ruins. You will come face to face with enormous tiki, sacrificial altar stones, and thousand-year-old relics, among the most significant in the Marquesas.

TAHUATA The name means “sunrise” in Marquesan, so it’s no wonder this tiny, 19-square-mile island presents a lovely vision of untouched South Pacific beauty. And what could be friendlier than that? Tahuata is the smallest of the inhabited islands on the Marquesas archipelago, and because it has only 600 residents, you’ll immediately feel welcomed by the locals (and quite possibly by a pod of dolphins, who love to play in the area).

You’ll arrive via the quaint village of Haptoni, where an open-air market presents a wealth of locally made handicrafts. No self-respecting South Seas traveler returns home without a carved tiki or a few pieces of hand-crafted jewelry. You’ll find beautiful specimens here.

It is believed that Tahuata was inhabited by Polynesians as early as 200 A.D. The island is rich with archaeological sites to be explored—and the ancient royal walkway with its floral-scented air is an enchanting setting for a stroll.

Discover the charm of the Haptoni wilderness accompanied by *The Gauguin*’s onboard anthropology and archaeology expert on the **Haptoni Discovery** excursion. Your all-terrain vehicle trek takes you to the villages of Haptoni and Vaitahu, where you will learn about the lifestyle and culture of the island. You’ll also visit the ancient church en route to a spectacular scenic lookout encompassing regal mountain peaks piercing the brilliant blue sky.

NUKU HIVA Be prepared to have your breath taken away. It will be promptly returned after that initial gasp at the beauty of Nuku Hiva.

The largest of the Marquesas Islands, Nuku Hiva is renowned for its wild terrain. Rugged cliffs nose-dive into the ocean. A carpet of green jungle creeps from the water’s edge, reaching upward. Shadows dance on the shoreline, and knifelike peaks disappear behind a scrim of clouds. The island’s bay is ideal for sailing and deep-sea fishing. On land, Nuku Hiva’s spectacular beauty is yours to discover during the off-road excursion **Visit of Taipivai Valley**, which will lead you through hidden valleys to truly stunning bay views. No one will ever accuse you of having no sense of adventure. For experienced, advanced-certification divers with at least 50 dives, the **SCUBA Hammerhead Sentry Point** excursion is a unique opportunity to see schools of scalloped hammerhead sharks, which frequently gather at the entrance of the bay where the plankton is ample. The sharks are shy, and visibility can be limited. The area is also rich with jack fish, tunas, and rays.

AT SEA Next up: two blissful days at sea as you approach the stunning final leg of this journey. You hardly need to be reminded, but don’t forget this is all about



you. You're on vacation, which means indulgence is mandatory. Whether that means a spa appointment, ordering two (or who's counting? Go for three!) desserts, or simply lounging the day away, you're allowed.

HUAHINE Any way you look at it—from the air, from the sea, above or below the water—Huahine is a stunner. On today's menu: lavish jungle, stately palms, warm sands, and a lagoon with a surface like glass.

To visit this island is to step back in time. Walk among French Polynesia's largest and best-preserved and restored archaeological sites, including more than 200 centuries-old dwellings, sacred relics, and ancient artifacts. The pace on Huahine is relaxed. Life is uncomplicated, and smiles come easily.

You'll have plenty of time to experience the island and stir up a little adventure, or kick your shoes off, get some sand between your toes, and take in the calm.

BORA BORA As long as you live, wherever you go, nothing will compare with awakening aboard the m/s *Paul Gauguin* as Bora Bora approaches in all its magnificence.

Breakfast on your balcony or on deck is a must. This has to be one of the South Pacific's most decadent views. Join your fellow passengers on deck and start snapping some pictures to post, tagged #nofilter. Be ready for responses like, "Yeah, right." For the uninitiated, this level of beauty just cannot be real—but it is.

Soar like an eagle over exquisite topography, and experience what you'll never see from the ground on the 30-minute Helicopter **Flightseeing—Bora Bora & Tupai** tour. The "Pearl of the Pacific" will open like an exquisite flower below you. You'll circle the island's highest peak, Mount Otemanu, and float over the famous heart-shaped motu of Tupai. Throughout the flightseeing, headphones connect you to the pilot's commentary as he points out the sights below.

TAHA'A [MOTU MAHANA]

Forget your troubles, deadlines, and responsibilities on this gentle little island that will steal your heart and tingle your senses. Taha'a's sweet, vanilla-scented air will stay with you like your first kiss, and its beauty will be forever imprinted in your mind.

If you made it your quest on this voyage to find your perfect beach, you may discover it here at Motu Mahana. Bring your complimentary snorkel gear from *The Gauguin*, choose your favorite chaise lounge, and spend the day in your own private slice of paradise.

MOOREA It seems like you could walk for miles in Moorea's waist-deep lagoon, with the soft sand beneath your feet, the kiss of the sun on your shoulders. Like the finest uncut lead crystal, the warm water has such clarity, it's almost as if it isn't there. Take a spin in a glass-bottom boat, snorkel, swim, or just float—and you will have the sensation of weightlessness. Looking landward, this magical lagoon is met by a carpet of jungle, which surrenders to the fractured shell of a once-mighty volcano. Everywhere you look is exceedingly beautiful.

PAPEETE, TAHITI And so you reach the conclusion of this chapter of your epic autobiography. Certainly, another chapter further on will begin with the words, "When we returned to *The Gauguin* for another voyage, we were welcomed like old friends, as if we had never been away."

Art Historian and Guest Lecturer

Paul Gauguin (1848–1903) had always been attracted to exotic places. From the age of 2 to 6, he lived in Lima, Peru. As a young adult, he plied the coasts of North and South America as a sailor in both the French Merchant Marine and the Navy. Once he became a full-time artist, he focused on Brittany, the Celtic province in Western France. As his art progressed and his curiosity for warmer and more exotic places grew, he turned to the French colonies farther afield: Martinique and Tahiti, finally finding his paradise in the Marquesas.

Arriving in Tahiti, in 1891, he was enchanted: Here he found brilliant tropical colors, strong, bright light that in the morning and evening saturated nature's colors and cast a warm glow over everything he saw. He also quickly discovered a civilization he had learned about only two years earlier at the Paris Universal Exposition, where Polynesian native huts (and people) had been on display, as well as Marquesan war clubs, bowls, and tiki figures. He took leave of his wife and five children with regret, but fully intended, at that point, to return to them one day as a successful, well-respected artist.

Gauguin was also filled with visions of scantily clad, beautiful Tahitian women ready to model for him and to introduce him to the idyllic life of ease and sexual freedom so vividly depicted by the French author Pierre Loti in *The Marriage of Loti*. He was confronted, instead, with a colonial French town populated by French administrators and Catholic priests, Europeans seeking their fortunes, and a rapidly decreasing native population decimated by imported European diseases for which they had no resistance. He soon fled Papeete for various villages along the coast, seeking indigenous models/companions with whom he could share his modest lodgings. He was curious about the fast disappearing Polynesian religion, customs, and daily life. Most vestiges of the past had been destroyed by the Church and French authorities. What he could not find, he made up in his paintings depicting peaceful scenes of women strolling or relaxing, wearing colorful *pareos* or the all-enveloping dresses mandated by the Catholic Church and still worn today.

But Tahiti soon lost its appeal for Gauguin, who wanted a more authentic experience. He believed that the Marquesas, part of French Polynesia since 1842, retained more of the traditions that had been lost in Tahiti. With high hopes of finding his utopia there, he left Tahiti in 1901. Six days on a steamship and 1,500 kilometers

later, he landed on the island of Hiva Oa and settled in the small town of Atuona, where he would be buried only 20 months later. Yes, it was more primitive than Papeete, but it still had a doctor, post office, Catholic mission, stores, and a police station. He was, after all, 53 years old and suffering from heart problems and severe, painful eczema; his definition of "primitive" had to be modified.

The Marquesas consists of six inhabited islands, all created from extinct volcanoes. Its tall volcanic mountains are often shrouded in mists and are steep, with craggy, irregular summits. Their flanks are carpeted with thick green forests and deep valleys that often end in gorges and waterfalls. There are no reefs or lagoons: the waves pound directly against the rocky

cliffs or on a few black-sand beaches. Scattered in the dense woods are vestiges of stone platforms that once supported simple open-air living spaces. Other stone complexes were dedicated to religious ceremonies, often decorated with massive stone tikis (ancestor figures). All of this was gone, or hidden deep in the valleys when Gauguin arrived. But he felt the mystery of the place and its past and tried to express this in his approximately 40 paintings, many sculptures and drawings, as well as the three book-length manuscripts he wrote there.

He managed to buy a piece of land right in the center of town and then designed and built a unique house that would give him both privacy to work and access to visitors. He called it La Maison de Jouir (The House

of Pleasure). It has been rebuilt to scale in the town's Centre Paul Gauguin and demonstrates, with its large studio looking out on the dramatic Mt. Tematiu, that making art was his priority. He tried to be part of village life—but on his own terms.


Gauguin was buried high above the town. His tomb overlooks the beautiful bay and is guarded by a sculpture of his own making. It, too, conveys Gauguin's fascination with the islands, their mysterious past, and his belief that he had finally found his artistic and spiritual paradise in the Marquesas Islands. ♦





advantage of the ship's floating bar (no South Pacific cruise is complete without drinking a cocktail from a real coconut), a bountiful beachside barbecue, and ample opportunities for watersports, swimming, and relaxation.

BORA BORA There, spread out in a lavish opulence of colors and textures in one of the world's most famous romance destinations: Bora Bora. AT SEA With a day left to your own devices on board *The Gauguin*, there is no time like the present to make this all about you. Breakfast in your stateroom or on your balcony is an excellent way to start. Spend the morning at a leisurely clip, catching up on news of the islands or reviewing the multitude of photos you've taken so far. Then, how about a nice workout at the fitness center followed by a beeline to the spa for some serious rejuvenation? A deep massage and soothing treatment will get your sun-kissed skin glowing. A fresh lunch *al fresco* at La Veranda, and next—you certainly are more than deserving—it might be time for a nap. Before you know it, it's time to slip into your evening finery and enjoy a sumptuous dinner at L'Etoile.

AITUTAKI It is believed that the second-most-visited of the Cook Islands was settled around 900 A.D. by the legendary Polynesian explorer Ru. Today, its inhabitants keep their history alive through song, dance, legends, and crafts, in particular *tivaevae*—intricate, handmade patchwork quilts unique to the Cook Islands, featuring designs inspired by nature.

The island's coral reefs enclose a vast lagoon—which many believe rivals the usually beyond-compare Bora Bora. Several hundred species of fish make this their home, so underwater activities are a must.

Join archaeologist guides on an adventure into the past and present culture of Aitutaki on the **Punarei Village Cultural Tour**. This trek includes visits to excavations, an ancient temple, and sacred sites. You'll also see traditional dances, demonstrations of weaving from coconut fronds, wood carving, tattooing, and more. Fresh fruits and sweet coconut will refresh you, grown in ecologically friendly gardens around the site you visit.

AT SEA (2 DAYS) As *The Gauguin* carries you toward the magical kingdom of Tonga, your days at sea are a welcome oasis of relaxation, rejuvenation, and discovery.

Onboard experts of world renown give you insights into the lands and seas you are discovering on this voyage. The Vava'u Islands are a wonderland of wildlife, and the lagoon is so clear, divers can see to an incredible depth of 130 feet. Beneath the gentle waves, spinner dolphins, giant clams, manta rays, sea turtles, and more than 100 species of tropical fish cavort through coral landscapes.

Above the water, the local market offers handicrafts and a bounty of locally grown fruits and vegetables, not to mention the freshest catch of the day. Take a guided tour of 'Ene'io Botanical Garden, and see more than 500 native Tongan beautiful flora.

AT SEA During your leisurely day at sea, learn more about the culture of the islands you're visiting with onboard lectures, presentations, and demonstrations. The traditional Tahitian dress for women, the *pareo* (or sarong) originated in the Cook Islands. Often brilliantly emblazoned with hibiscus flowers, indigenous designs, or traditional *tapa* patterns, today, *pareos* are sported by both men and women, and there are many ways to tie and wear them. Learn how from Les Gauguines.

SAVUSAVU How does this sound: a day on a beautiful tropical island where the cares of the outside world don't stand a chance of finding you?

Like a smile that can't be suppressed, the island of Vanua Levu in northern Fiji presents itself with blushing splendor. Charming, unassuming, and unspoiled, the second-largest of Fiji's 300 islands extends a warm welcome with lush green hills surrounded by coral reefs. Some call it the "Hidden Paradise of Fiji," and you will agree.

Described by Jean-Michel Cousteau as the "Soft Coral Capital of the World," Fiji offers some of the world's finest SCUBA diving, with a dazzling array of first-rate dive sites. If you're a diver, consider joining the **SCUBA 1 Tank** excursion. Internationally certified dive operators will lead you to spectacular hard and soft corals, caves, and grottos, and diverse marine life including sharks, turtles, tuna, and fish of all shapes, colors, and sizes.

SUVA Located on Fiji's largest island, Suva is perched on a hilly peninsula between two harbors. Every view is a stunning combination

of blues and greens, volcanic cliffs, and velvet jungles. The city is a fascinating mix of modern and colonial architecture, and life here is all about laid-back sophistication. As the largest urban area in the South Pacific outside of Australia and New Zealand, Suva is rich in Fijian culture, with museums, galleries, and marketplaces to explore. Fiji's highest peak, Mt. Tomanivi is an exquisite landmark from every vantage point. The shell of this ancient volcano is an unforgettable climb for experienced hikers.

BEQA ISLAND* It seems that everyone you meet in Fiji is wearing a smile. And when you behold the tiny island of Beqa (pronounced "BENG-uh"), it's easy to understand why. The startlingly turquoise lagoon is cradled in the crater of an extinct volcano. Waterfalls tumble, golden sands sparkle, and gentle breezes whisper secrets of this paradise rich in tradition and heritage, where the ancient ritual of Fijian firewalking began.

Located about six miles off the coast of Fiji's main island, Viti Levu, Beqa may be tiny—less than six square miles in territory—but the hospitality here is as big as the South Pacific.

There are no paved roads and only a sprinkling of friendly villages. From the lush forests, trees heavy with coconut and papaya wave a friendly hello. Pristine beaches frame one of the world's largest barrier reefs, a paradise for divers, snorkelers, and fishing enthusiasts.

LAUTOKA Fiji's largest island, Viti Levu, is the hub of the Fijian Islands. And what a visual: the city of Lautoka is known as "Sugar City" for the golden-green sugarcane that surrounds it on three sides, and the sparkling blue Pacific Ocean forms its western border. The palm-lined main street invites strolling, shopping, and exploration. The lagoon is perfect for kite surfing, sailing, and surfing; a playground awaits beneath the surface for diving and snorkeling. And the beaches? Flawless, with super-fine white sand and swaying coconut palms.

One of the island's highlights is the Garden of the Sleeping Giant, which includes manicured lawns, lily ponds, fountains, and more than 2,000 truly rare Asian and Cattleya orchid hybrids, once the private collection of actor Raymond Burr. A fitting end to your idyllic voyage!

“ MOTU MAHANA: This day feels like a huge beach party with your closest friends. If you don't feel like getting out of the water, order a drink from the floating bar. Bring cash to pick up a souvenir from the local artisans. When you're back on board and sailing away from the island, you can capture a beautiful sunset passing a charming little church along the waterfront, and views of Mount Otemanu, as Bora Bora sits in the distance. ”

Why You Should Take Your Kids to French Polynesia

When one thinks of French Polynesia, what comes to most people's minds are floating bungalows and honeymooners holding hands on the shores of crystal-clear lagoons. What do I think of instead? I think of my son frolicking in sun-warmed waters with a huge smile on his face. Yes, the French Polynesian islands are very romantic—but they're surprisingly kid-friendly, too! As a seasoned traveler, I know the amazing life lessons kids learn from traveling and experiencing local cultures. French Polynesia has so many cultural, historical, and natural wonders to offer families—the question is why *wouldn't* you take your kids?

I have taken the 7-night *Tahiti & the Society Islands* itinerary twice with my family, and I must say, the m/s *Paul Gauguin* is truly the best way to experience French Polynesia. So many adventures filled each day... where do I begin? I think the easiest way to explain how wonderful the destination and the ship are for families is to describe our experiences port-by-port:

HUAHINE

My 11-year-old son loves history, so a highlight of this island was Fare Pote'e, a museum housed in a replica of an open traditional house. Fare was the seat of local power for the island, so there are a host of *marae* (religious sites built from stone) scattered along the shoreline. If you are interested in how pearls or vanilla are produced, you can easily visit these farms and be amazed in the production processes. And if you're feeling brave and adventurous, visit Faie, and see (and even feed sardines to) Huahine's famous and sacred blue-eyed eels.

MOTU MAHANA

Motu Mahana (*The Gauguin's* private islet) is just the place to dip in and do some great snorkeling, kayaking, and swimming. Or just lounge on the sandbar or build a sand castle—all of which my son gladly did. Children and adults alike can enjoy fascinating legends told by the ship's entertainers, Les Gauguines and Les Gauguins—not to mention lounging in the dappled shade of a palm tree while sipping a fresh coconut drink!

BORA BORA

As a history buff, my son appreciated learning about Bora Bora's strategic role in World War II. He also delighted in the coral ring surrounding the island that makes Bora Bora an ideal place to snorkel and dive. He took *The Gauguin's* onboard **Discover SCUBA Diving** program on both sailings, so that we could all dive together as a family. The ship's dive team is very knowledgeable, amiable, and thorough, and they put my son right at ease. Both Bora Bora and Moorea have wonderful shallow dive sites for beginners (under 30 feet) where beautiful coral and fish are abundant. The clarity is wonderful to the point that you forget you are underwater!

I think I have hundreds of pictures of my son giving me underwater OK and hang-ten hand signals, he enjoyed it so much!

MOOREA

Moorea was our favorite island! (We loved it so much, we spent an additional week there after each cruise.) We loved visiting the idyllic motus and snorkeling until our fingers and toes turned into prunes. My son couldn't get enough of the friendly rays and colorful fish. And what little boy wouldn't be over the moon to come face to face with blacktip sharks? Moored at Moorea, my son also had a blast kayaking and paddleboarding on turquoise and cobalt blue waters off the ship's watersports marina.

By land, make sure you make it up to the Belvedere lookout point, where there are lush and gorgeous vistas of Opunohu Bay and Mt. Rotui. My son took tons of pictures there since it is so breathtaking. We also stopped at Marae Titiroa, where marae are linked by a walking track. My son loved this trek through the cool dense forest of chestnut trees that shelter these historical sacred landmarks.

ABOARD SHIP

Life aboard ship filled out the experience for our family with beautiful Polynesian shows, gourmet Tahitian and French foods, hands-on crafts, and interesting lectures about the history, culture, and the environment of the region by very knowledgeable speakers. On each voyage, we were blown away by the kindness of the ship's crew and how especially sweet they were to my son.

It was with heavy hearts that we departed the ship each time. The amazing people and places we visited linger in our hearts and minds, and we are forever changed as a family by our experiences.

So, yes... Tahiti can be for lovers... but it is also most definitely for families!

Nothing beats the life experience and travel education of a trip on board *The Gauguin*. Children delight in learning about culture from Les Gauguines; trying out new watersports and learning about marine life from the ship's marina staff and the Moana Explorer Family Program* (see page 40); and basking in the attention of the ship's crew as they learn about life at sea.
